- A new voluntary separation package ("incentivized retirement") is being considered.

NEW FACULTY COLLEAGUES

- 26 new faculty joined the University this fall consisting of:
 - 12 new tenure-track / tenured faculty members;
 - 8 new clinical / of practice faculty members; and
 - 6 visiting faculty members
- The Faculty Orientation Extended group (all faculty within the first 5 years of their initial CUA appointment) will be led through readings and discussions on the topic: "Catholic Social Teaching: It's More Than you Think!" The husband-and-wife team of Dr. Melissa Moschella, Associate Professor in the School of Philosophy, and Dr. David Cloutier, Ordinary Professor in the School of Theology and Religious Studies, will be leading this group, which will meet for a series of six discussions over lunch on selected Wednesdays throughout this academic year.

 - Law 389 vs. budget of 437 (11.0% below budget)

<u>NEW LEARNING MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (LMS)</u>

- Angela McRae, Danny Beason (CTE), and Tilmon Smith (Tech Services) are implementing the LMS transition plan from Blackboard to Brightspace.
- LMS Steering Committee meets monthly and has representatives from all 12 schools.
- Pilot of 18 courses is currently in place with 18 instructors and 309 students.
- Pilot continues in Spring; full implementation by Fall 2024.
- A comprehensive training program is being developed and will begin in Spring 2024.
- Positive responses so far from faculty and students using the system this semester.
